Student Attendance

We understand that regular attendance plays a vital role in student success. Keeping a close eye on student attendance is important, however, we don't just look at attendance as a statistic, but as a key indicator of engagement and wellbeing.

Attendance data is carefully monitored throughout the year, with the average attendance rate calculated as a percentage based on the number of days students are present compared to the days they're expected at school. Each student's attendance, including absences and lateness, is outlined in their semester report to provide a clear picture to families.

If we notice a student developing a pattern of non-attendance, we reach out to the family to offer support because helping students return to the classroom is a priority. By actively tracking attendance and working in partnership with families, we help ensure every student has the ability to make the most of the opportunities provided at school.




Year 12 Results

100% of Year 12 students achieved the SACE certificate in 2024


The highest ATAR in 2024 was 91.55




School Income by Funding Source
